Seasonal Overview

Advent, as a season is hard to trace historically. We don't know when it started exactly, we can only say that it was being observed by the 5th century. Advent comes from the Latin *adventus* which means "coming."

Advent is a season of preparation for Christ's advent into the world. We live out the longing and angst of the world as the promised Messiah felt delayed. Advent helps us approach Christmas in a proper state of mind. We are not allowed to rush from Thanksgiving to Christmas, from feast to feast.

You will often hear Advent described as a season that is about 3 advents, not just one.

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PRAY & REFLECT

Prayer is a foundational Christian habit, so it fits in every season of the year, but we often find its focus shifts. In Advent, a helpful prayer to make habit is called an "examen" prayer. Examen seeks to become aware of God's presence by reviewing the day. If you've never prayed the examen, we have a "missional examen" you can find on our Advent webpage. This helps us become aware of the places of our lives in which God has already advented.

One way that we can prepare is to re-acquaint ourselves with God, through Scripture and devotional readings. One of the things we do every year at Westwood is invite our church to bless us with devotional thoughts. Pick up one of the devotional booklets and read each day's thought. You can also purchase other advent devotionals for your family and read them at a meal together. Our kids love to light a candle while we read and discuss!





December has a way to really make obvious who are the haves and who are the have-lesses. The third Sunday of Advent is called *Gaudete* Sunday, which is Latin for rejoice. It is marked by a pink candle rather than a purple one. One way that we can bring joy to our neighbor is by serving the neighbor. We rejoice that Jesus is coming into the world. Perhaps we can be the face of Jesus to our neighbors by serving at a soup kitchen, gift drive, or donating to the organizations serving those among our community in need. May we not only rejoice, but bring joy.

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We don't often think of Advent or Christmas as times of repentance, but we would do well to remember that God's love coming in a baby is because of our brokenness. If there was no need to repent, Jesus would never have been born. The Holy Spirit came into our hearts when we repented of our sin and were baptized. Even today, "we have not loved him with our whole hearts." Advent is a reminder that God comes when we don't deserve it, and that inspires us to repent.
